Dear Sister & Family:

It has been a long time since I have heard from you and has been some time since I wrote you but I guess you have been hearing from me just the same through Mother. This is the day after ^{lent} Thomas and it is ~~the~~ cold snow on the ground a regular Thomas time. I worked hard yesterday trying to give the boys a good dinner we had some pictures taken of part of the dinner and if they are good will try and send you one of them to let you know what kind of a time we had. In the afternoon I laid down and had a sleep so you know the day

passed of secrets. I have been
in Germany for over a month
now. I has been raining the
most of the time but now I
think it will be much better
as it has turned cold. I have
a good place to stay with a
German family. In a small
room with a good feather bed
table for writing water to
wash things are very handy.

I wrote Mother and told her
about my trip through the
country and guess you have
read it before now as she sends
my letters to you.

I am feeling fine guess that
I ought to for I only weighed
142 pounds the other day
more than I ever weighed before
in my life. Don't know just
when I will get back on

the other side of the pond
but hope it won't be long.
Perhaps it will be on my way
in a short time after you
get this letter. I think as soon
as peace is signed that will
clear this country.
Well I suppose you had a
big time yesterday and got
lots of Xmas presents. I got
my Xmas box just two days
a head of time and believe
me things sure did taste good
from home since then.
Hoping this finds all well as
it leaves me.
